



Census Measurement of Race and Ethnicity





The U.S. Census Bureau has collected data on race since the first census in 1790 and on Hispanic or Latino origin since the 1970 Census. How these topics are measured, and statistics on them are collected and coded, has changed nearly every decade throughout the history of the census, reflecting social, political and economic factors.

The previous slide shows that the Hispanic or Latino population grew by 15.7% between 2010 and 2020. However, the Hispanic or Latino population as a proportion of the total population increased by 1 percentage point (from 29.6% in 2010 to 30.7% in 2020). This is how the numbers for all other groups should be interpreted.

Measure of Racial and Ethnic Diversity



• Diversity Index (DI): The probability that two people chosen at random will be from different race and ethnic groups.

$$DI = 1 - (H^2 + W^2 + B^2 + AIAN^2 + Asian^2 + NHPI^2 + SOR^2 + Multi^2)$$

- Prevalence Rankings: The percentage of the population that falls into the largest racial and ethnic group, second largest group, and third largest group.
- Diffusion Score: The percent of the population that is <u>not</u> in the first, second, or third largest racial/ethnic groups combined.

Demo the "Predominant Race and Ethnicity" Map.

- 1. Overview of all Arizona counties;
- 2. The predominant race and ethnicity of each county and the strength of predominance;
- 3. Navajo County: compare the area that contains Winslow, Holbrook, Snowflake, Show Low, and Pinetop-Lakeside (predominantly White) with the northern and southern ends of the county (predominantly Native American);
- 4. Maricopa County: the concentration of Hispanics in the West Valley (west of 19 th Ave and south of Northern Ave), south Phoenix, near the airport, and in the central parts of Mesa and Chandler;
- 5. An area southwest of the Chandler Region Airport: one has to go to the block group and block levels to find an area that is predominantly Asian.
- 6. Tucson area: Hispanics along the I-10 corridor and south and west of I-10; White, non-Hispanic population in the north and east part of the region.
