I live and work in CD-8 with my senior parents in growing Northwestern Maricopa County, in the city of Surprise, and I am here this morning to give you information about my communities of interest. My district 8 community includes agriculture, ranching, small and large businesses, civic centers and schools, construction and development, churches, parks and recreation in the north and west of Maricopa County. Healthcare is one of the largest employers, as are schools, colleges and community colleges, and governmental entities, among them, Luke AFB. My family and friends frequent the Bell Rd and 83rd corridor for shopping, dining, recreation, Spring Training, events around the Arrowhead Mall and Paradise shopping area. Various other sports teams are supported by our surrounding cities of Peoria, Surprise, and Glendale, and their members live in our residential areas and attend our schools. When redistricting last occurred, our fairly compact district was spread from New River in the north and east of the 17, to Litchfield Park south of the 10, spreading us well beyond our core areas and communities of interest, to combine us with those areas whom we had rarely visited and thereby diluting our needs and interests. Our community believed that the Commission would follow the 6 key items that the State Constitution set forth, and instead we were given boundaries which did not evenly distribute the affected population, and fostered a competitive spirit instead of community and cohesion, stretching us from the far north (where I rarely go) to well south of our community of interest. My cohesive community is generous and takes care of those in need within its churches, schools, cities, and distinctive housing developments, but we have been stretched beyond our effectiveness with the design of the last district map.
